Columbus parks. State Street has new bike lanes and an improved sidewalk as the City prepares designs on a new streetscape from the Old State House to Atlantic Avenue. Improvements are underway to keep storm surge waters out of many Wharf District properties including the Greenway Rings Fountain electrical vault and the Aquarium Station headhouse, one of many components that are part of the Climate Ready Boston Report. The city hopes to be able to present the completed report at the October 20 Wharf District Council Zoom meeting. After a long and successful career Captain Kenneth Fong has retired and his replacement has been announced – Captain Robert Ciccolo, a 37 year veteran of the Boston Police Department.

Sworn in as an officer in 1987, he has had a very diverse career within BPD. He was a patrolman and sergeant in Mattapan, lieutenant in Jamaica Plain and the Station Captain in Hyde Park. Most recently, he spent the last four and a half years as the Night Commander for the North Zone, which includes District A-1,* so he is already familiar with the neighborhood, making him a perfect fit for the job.

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



The City of Boston is taking a fresh look at State Street in an effort to bring vibrancy to this historic area and to better meet the needs of the traveling public.

As one of the oldest streets in Boston, it serves as a gateway to the City for residents and visitors from around the world. The City plans to redesign State Street, making improvements from Surface Road to Congress Street. They will include:

- » sidewalks that are accessible
- » lighting upgrades
- » bicycle accommodations, and
- » safety improvements.

As a first step in the design process, the City has implemented the Healthy Streets initiative, a pilot project using traffic control drums to increase space for pedestrians and bicyclists on State Street. This pilot serves a dual purpose: 1) to provide space for social

distancing, and 2) to test a 'people-first' design for State Street that better accommodates all street users

What is your vision for State Street?

- » The City would like your thoughts on the pilot project, which is an attempt to reduce the road width and increase space for bicyclists and pedestrians.
- » As the City continues to look into the redesign of State Street, you have an opportunity to provide feedback on how you use State Street today and what you would like in the future.

It is important that your voice be heard. Your comments and concerns will be taken into consideration as the work continues toward developing a new design for State Street.

BOSTON HARBOR CRUISES – AUTUMN UPDATE

Throughout the summer we've made every effort to re-open our ferries and excursions with great care and a focus on the health and safety of our customers and employees. With the implementation of reduced capacities and schedules, stringent cleaning protocols, required facial coverings on vessels (both indoors and outdoors), social distancing, touchless ticketing, and more, BHC has been doing its part

to operate in a safe and responsible manner, following all local, state, and federal guidelines.

Here are the current BHC offerings, and the days of operation (with the caveat that all schedules are subject to change):

- » **New England Aquarium Whale Watch** – Trips daily at 10AM through October 12 and perhaps longer. (Additional trips will be added on an as needed basis. Whale Watches may continue into late October depending on weather conditions.)
- » **Fast Ferry to Provincetown/Cape Cod** – Operating Thursday–Sunday through October 12, departing Boston at 9AM, and returning from Ptown at 4PM.
- » **90-minute narrated Sunset Cruise** – Operating Friday and Saturday nights through October 10, with departures at 6PM.
- » **45-minute narrated USS Constitution Cruise** – Our most popular sightseeing cruise currently operates daily with departures at 11:30AM, 1:30PM, and 3:30PM.

- » **Ferry to Spectacle Island** – With beautiful views of the Boston skyline, picturesque walking paths, and even a small beach, Spectacle Island makes for an excellent and quick “getaway” experience. Operating Friday through Sunday through October 12, with departures at 10AM, 12 noon, and 2PM, and with an extra 4PM trip on Sundays.
- » **MBTA Ferries to Hingham, Hull, Logan Airport and Charlestown Navy Yard** – Check MBTA website.

Due to the challenges of this unusual season, the following services have been temporarily discontinued until spring of 2021: Codzilla “splash-boat” ride, Salem Ferry, and BHC Water Taxis.

On behalf of everyone at Boston Harbor Cruises, I'd like to thank all of you for your support and friendship. We look forward to continuing to be a good neighbor, and to sharing in the important work of the Wharf District Council.



NEW ENGLAND AQUARIUM

TAKE A BREAK

This fall, take a break from your world and connect to the wonders of the ocean at the New England Aquarium.

Visit Central Wharf to see the African and Rockhopper penguins, fur seals, and sea lions, and to meet Tatoosh, the New England Aquarium's newest octopus. The two-year-old, nearly 8-pound giant Pacific octopus—the largest of the world's 250 species of octopus—is named after an island that is part of a chain of islands off the coast of Washington in the Olympic Coast Sanctuary.

The Aquarium is now open until 8PM on Friday nights. Once the sun sets, the Aquarium lights dim, too, to mimic the naturally occurring hours of nighttime. Visitors who come during Friday night hours will notice the lighting changes, particularly in the Giant Ocean Tank (GOT), which simulates natural lighting transitions to help maintain the rhythm of a Caribbean coral reef and ensure the animals' well-being. Visitors might even spot a few animals that are particularly active in the evening! Last entry time is one hour before closing.

Ocean lovers may also connect with the 20,000 animals in the Aquarium online through our social media channels. Videos on Facebook and YouTube feature animal care staff, visitor educators, and the animals in the Aquarium, as well as veterinarians and biologists in our Sea Turtle Rescue program and scientists in our Anderson Cabot Center for Ocean Life.

Hosting a group, corporate event, or virtual birthday party? Book a virtual animal encounter, offered daily, with fur seals or sea lions, harbor seals, penguins, or the animals in the GOT. Through Zoom sessions, Aquarium staff members provide intimate experiences with an up-close look at the animals, share facts about the species, and answer questions from participants. Animal

LANTERN STORIES: GREENWAY CONSERVANCY ANNOUNCES NEW PUBLIC ARTWORK

The [Rose Kennedy Greenway Conservancy](#) has announced the installation of a new artwork by Boston-based artist Yu-Wen Wu. Wu's [Lantern Stories](#), inspired by more than a year of community engagement, will be on display this fall in Auntie Kay and Uncle Frank Chin Park on The Greenway. It joins five other contemporary artworks currently on display across The Greenway.

Lantern Stories, commissioned by Greenway Conservancy, celebrates Boston's Chinatown community. Wu's

installation came together after a year and half of community listening sessions, design, and fabrication. Wu created thirty lanterns to illuminate the history of immigration, the community's culture, and resiliency. Some of the images relate to the long and fraught history of Chinese immigration to the United States, beginning with the California Gold Rush in the 1850s to current times. Other images celebrate Chinese culture, the community's strong commitment to education, entrepreneurship, and social justice. The colors used throughout the installation are central to Asian culture: red which symbolizes happiness and good fortune, and gold, symbolizing prosperity.

Lanterns represent light and guide the way forward, illuminating the darkness. From humble beginnings as a candle flame surrounded by bamboo, silk or paper, the lantern has become an integral part of celebrations that foster hope and pave the way to a brighter future.



CENTRAL WHARF PARK ARTWORK

The popular three wooden rings framing Central Wharf Park, Growth Rings by Oscar Tuazon, are soon to be replaced by another site-specific artwork that beacons residents and visitors alike to explore their urban parks. Now + There, the Boston-based public art non-profit responsible for Growth Rings and other temporary public art throughout the city, will present To Each Era Its Art. To Art, Its Freedom by renowned Mexican artist Jose Dávila. The work, curated by Boston-based independent curator Pedro Alonzo, will open in early November and remain up through the summer of 2021.

Both meditative and provocative, To Each Era Its Art. To Art, Its Freedom was created in response to our times and the

uniquely arboreal space of Central Wharf Park. Composed of 21 custom-made concrete shapes that are variations of a standard cube with river boulders balancing on top, To Each Era Its Art. To Art, Its Freedom creates a dynamic field of vibrant red-colored geometric forms with natural juxtapositions that punctuate and accentuate the park. The work, which intentionally invites the public to sit, rest and play, among the sculptural shapes, explores publicness in a time of physical distancing and aims to demonstrate ways that art can shift centers of creative power into the public realm.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

The Wharf District Council has commenced the process of organizing resources to help our community and neighbors prepare for emergencies in our ever-changing world. In addition to our current pandemic, recent news cycles have been dominated by heat waves, fires, hurricanes to name just a few emergencies.

WDC has partnered with Boston's Office of Emergency Management. Ky'Ron Owens, the Director of Communications for OEM, is helping guide us through procedures and resources. OEM works with Boston's public safety and public health agencies. OEM plans and prepares for emergencies, educates, trains, and performs other services to support the City's preparedness. They also manage the Boston Emergency Operations Center, made up of a staff of professionals and liaisons from City public safety agencies. The Center facilitates planning and aid in the aftermath of a disaster.

We kicked off this partnership at our August 18 meeting. In future meetings we will be bringing in other experts who are a part of the emergency community including fire, police and EMS. The more information we have the better we can support our families and neighbors.
